#### Kilham School are Humberside Champions and one step from Wembley!



After success in the Driffield Schools tournament and then the East Riding football championships, Kilham year 5 and 6 boys travelled to Grimsby on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> November for the next level of competition - the Humberside Finals. The boys played 4 matches, Airmyn Park Primary School were their first opponents, with Kilham winning 3 - 0, and then St James Church of England Primary School were also beaten 3 -0! Barmby Moor were next - tougher opposition who were unlucky to concede an own goal early on, however it was caused by the pressure from the Kilham forwards and Kilham ended up beating them 3 - 0 as well! The final match was against Enfield Primary School. The boy's pattern of play continued in the final match and despite some strong attacks from Enfield, Kilham won the game 2-0!

Mrs Atkinson said, "Winning the tournament with a maximum 12 points and no goals conceded was a fantastic achievement."

Their next outing will be to an inter-counties tournament in Nottingham in March, the winners of which will play in the National final at Wembley Stadium!

#### **2nd Annual Wolds Wassail**

The second annual wolds wassail took place on Saturday 16th January. The event which was originally planned to take place in Colemans Cider Company's orchard in Ruston Parva had to be relocated to The Old Star at the last minute due to poor weather conditions.

The term wassail is based on the Old English words wæs (bu) hæl which translates to mean 'be healthy' or 'be whole' and form the basis of the modern English phrase 'hale and hearty'. It is a traditional ceremony which seeks to start off the first stirrings of life in the land and to help it emerge from winter and to ensure that the next season's crop of fruit, especially apples and pears, will be bountiful.

Traditionally orchard wassailing was concentrated in those parts of England where the growing of apples was most prevalent e.g. in Somerset and Devon; in Worcestershire and Herefordshire, in Shropshire and Gloucestershire.

The wassailing ceremony frequently begins in the afternoon with those taking part process down to the orchard, ceremonially bearing the wassail bowl and carrying large sticks and such items as drums, kettles, pans and whistles and anything else which can be used to create lots of noise. The ceremony generally begins with the trees being variously serenaded with traditional "wake up" type of chants and rhymes praising the trees, their fruitfulness in previous years and exhorting them to do even better in the coming year. These chants include:-

> Hats full! Caps full! Bushel - bushel - sacks full And my pockets full too! Huzza!





The custom the continues with the trees being beaten about the trunk with the sticks which is believed to begin the process of awakening the tree. It is accompanied by much shouting and the making of as much noise as possible, to assist the tree in awakening from its winter sleep as well as frightening away any evil spirits which might be lurking in the branches. Finally pieces of toasted bread soaked in cider into forks in the branches or hollows in the tree and left there as offerings, whether to the tree or to the robins.

The Wolds Wassail started with at 2.30pm with performances by Bridlington's Makara Morris Group. The Morris dancers then led the procession to Colemans Cider Company orchard in the village where the Wassail Ceremony took place. Participants then retired to the Old Star, to enjoy Colemans Cider Company's new range of ciders and to be entertained by a range of local musicians including Carrie Martin, Dogfinger Steve, Martin Heaton, The Smugglers and the Sticklebricks.

You may have seen in the press that the Archbishop of Canterbury is working with other churches to fix the date of Easter (something people have been trying to do since the 10<sup>th</sup> century!) Don't worry about pencilling the new date in your diary yet though; even if all goes well it could take 10 years. In the meantime we'll still have the moveable date for Easter Day which can fall anywhere between 22<sup>nd</sup> March and 25<sup>th</sup> April. This year we have a very early one; 27<sup>th</sup> March. That of course means Lent is early this year and you will see that Ash Wednesday (the start of Lent) is on 10th February.

Throughout the centuries Christians have looked on Lent as a special time of spiritual development (a little bit like giving yourself a spiritual workout or spring clean). #### KNIT AND NATTER GROUP

The Knitters and Natterers have been meeting every first Monday in the month at 2.00 in the Chapel (using the side door) for over 6 years.

In that time 5492 items have been made including 1105 teddies and 542 cot blankets also 832 hats, 719 jumpers and filled 346 shoeboxes.

Our items have been sent far afield to Nepal, Albania, Sierra Leone, Mombasa and Moldavia.

We have raised £1127 which has been donated to Real Aid, Water Aid and Air Ambulance.

Recently we have started to help Tiny Treasures in Driffield whose aim is to provide handmade items for premature babies in the Neonatal Intensive Care Units. So far we have made 186 items, mainly jumpers and bootees.

To help us continue our efforts we would appreciate any donations of Double Knit or 4 Ply wool. Any colours can be used and any small or left over balls are welcome. Wool can be taken to the Chapel or to Denise at Glencoe House (Opposite the butchers)

Finally everyone who would like to come to our meetings would be most welcome. We always have light refreshments and plenty of nattering.

Kilham Parish Council is in the process of applying for a grant in order to purchase a portable defibrillator for use by the whole village, details on how that will work are to follow.




