"From the school"

Two buses left Kilham at 7am for the journey to the Premiership Champions ground – the King Power Stadium. At 10.30am the team walked through the players tunnel and out onto the Leicester City pitch – what an awesome arena!

There were 2 tournaments being played, so the pitch was divided into 4 for the 7-a-side games. Kilham were on pitches C and D and began by playing the Northern Finalists: Barkston Ash Primary. It was a nervous start and the opposition seemed to be on top, but the Kilham boys worked hard and were more dominant in the second half. However, no goals were scored in a 0-0 draw and not a bad start.

About 60 supporters had made the journey with the team. They moved onto pitch C for the second match, which was closest to the West Stand where the supporters were. They were in great voice and certainly helped the boys to a 3-0 victory against Shernold Primary (South-East Champions) with goals from Jack, Daniel and a goal-mouth scramble from Eddie.

Between matches Tom was interviewed on camera by Danone, the organising sponsors. The boys had to keep taking on plenty of water as the day was very warm. Eddie took a game as goalkeeper due to Alistair feeling sick; struggling a little with heat.

In the final pool match, the boys were against All Cannings who represented the South West - also on pitch C and again they dominated possession. Another win this time 1-0, scored by Daniel. So with a total of 7 points out of 9, a clean sheet and a goal difference of +4, they were runners-up of Pool B on goal difference.

With no break they were straight to the semi-final, which was back on pitch D and required a change of shirts; the opposition were also in red and white. Kilham wore their amber kit with the school name emblazoned on the front. Unfortunately despite holding possession well they were caught out and the opposition – the champions from Pool A – they slipped one past Alistair, the Kilham goalkeeper, spoiling his so far clean sheet. However, the boys did not panic and were rewarded soon after with a goal through Jack. With 1-1 at the end of full time and feeling quite weary by this time they started in earnest with extra time – still 1-1 at the turn around, but always looked like the threat of a goal, it eventually came from Ewan to give a 2-1 win and a place in the National Final. So down to the last 2 teams – the FA cup final of U11 football! The other finalists were Barkston Ash Primary, who Kilham had played in the first match of the day.

Coaches Elaine Atkinson and Wayne Overfield just asked the boys to enjoy the game and this settled the nerves and very quickly they gained possession and had the best of the play. The opposition however were not lying down and kept fighting back, goals eluded both sides, although at one point the ball did go in the back of the Barkston net, but the referee had already blown to speak to boys from both sides who were jostling for position in the box. The free kick was taken again by Kilham but with a different result – no goal. There were some great saves from both goalkeepers, but at the end of full-time and extra-time the teams had to move on to the lottery of penalties. Kilham took the first penalty, which was secured by Jack, then Riley with the second 2-2, however then things started to go a little tense as the goal keeper saved Kilham's next penalty. The tension continued as Alistair saved the next, still 2-2. It was the best of 5 and the nerves got the best of the takers and finally after 2 more misses the boys had to settle to being the second best team on England to Barkston Ash Primary in the cruellest of deciders 3-2.

Elaine Atkinson the year 6 class teacher and coach said, 'It has been an unbelievable dream, I have been watching this group of boys since they were in Year 2 – I knew they were something special. I cannot thank Wayne Overfield enough for supporting me with them in the build-up and on the day, his knowledge and footballing experience has been invaluable.'

By the end of the day Mr England, the head teacher, was quite hoarse from all the vocal support, as were many of the parents and friends. He commented, "I would like to thank all the players and their families, and all the extra supporters, for their wonderful support – not just today but through the whole year. There was a real family atmosphere today which really shows what our school is about. Thank you also to Elaine Atkinson for coordinating the team through the year and to Wayne Overfield for his time organising training, practice matches and for his tactical knowledge. The boys have hopefully had an experience they will never forget and we are immensely proud, not only of their success but also of the sportsmanship they displayed. Well done boys!"

Kilham School would also like to publicly thank the sponsors of the coaches; Driffield, Bridlington and North Wolds Lions Clubs, The Horace Taylor Trust, Dave Harrison, Richard Zerny, several parents and Kilham School Parents, Teachers and Friends Association. Without their financial support we would not have been able to travel as we did to the regional and national tournaments. Thank you.

Our bus service has now changed.

Our village bus service is now operated by EYMS using the route via Driffield Road, Middle Street and Thwing Road. Where there are no bus stops the service will operate as a 'Hail and Ride', this means the bus will stop anywhere it is safe to do so.

The new timetable allows for the first time **Full Use of All Bus Passes** and a longer, more useful length of time at both venues on market days.

The cost of each journey for a FULL FARE ADULT RETURN is just £2.40 to Driffield and £2.25 to Bridlington. Under 16's travel half price and for those with a bus pass it is **FREE.** Single journeys are available. We hope you will agree with the council that this provides very good value for money.

Some of you may be already aware that funding cuts have resulted in the loss of the Saturday service as it was considered not to be viable by the East Riding of Yorkshire Council. The Parish Council feel that if we want to maintain any service at all we must make the most of the bus. Improved passenger numbers would mean an improved service.

Please support our bus service if you can and consider letting the bus take the fuss out of your journey. Just think, no hassle parking and you can enjoy the scenery. It is a pleasant way to travel and it's cheap or even free. Remember the old adage—USE IT OR LOOSE IT? Councillor Denise Hayhurst.

Yorkwold Sponsored Awareness Walk in memory of

Alexander Forman and Richard Pooley

On the 25th June Driffield based firm Yorkwold Pigpro Ltd are organising a 25 mile sponsored walk in memory of East Yorkshire farmers Alexander Forman and Richard Pooley, who tragically lost their lives in December whilst working on a farm on Sunk Island, East Yorkshire. Alexander, 32, has left behind Lucy and 1 year old son Felix. Richard, 36, has left behind Amanda and 4 year old Josh.

The walkers, of which there are expected to be more than a 100, will consist of Forman and Pooley family and friends and Yorkwold employees, family and friends. The walk will begin at the Yorkwold headoffice at Driffield and start with a brisk walk through Driffield. The walk will then follow the Driffield Canal to Wansford, before heading north through Nafferton, Lowthorpe and Kilham. The walkers will then heads up onto the Wolds in earnest before looping back to the Yorkwold headoffice where a hog roast, courtesy of Hot Trotters Hog Roast Co, will be enjoyed by all. Those who do not feel up to the full 25 miles will be completing a 5, 10 or 15 mile stretch of the walk with all walkers finishing at the same time and location.

All monies raised by the walkers will go to 2 separate funds to support Felix and Josh in the hope that they can get as good a start in life as possible. The Forman family run an arable and pig farm on Sunk Island and have looked after York-wold pigs on a Bed & Breakfast basis for almost 20 years. Joe Dewhirst, of Yorkwold Pigpro, said "We have a very long standing relationship with the Forman family as they have looked after our pigs for many years. We wanted to do something special in memory of Zander and Rich, to create awareness of the dangers of working on farms and to raise money for the 2 young boys' futures. It will be an emotional day, but hopefully we can do some good despite the tragic circumstances."

The accident happened in December 2015 when Alexander and Richard were carrying out some routine work on a slurry system on the Forman family pig farm. The exact details of the accident will probably never be known but the outcome was that both men lost their lives in the pig farm's slurry reception chamber. The focus of the walkers is that awareness is raised so that a tragedy like this never happens again.

One big event to mention is a special service in July to commemorate the Battle of the Somme. Brenda Eveliegh has a great heart for this and has worked to arrange the service. 2016 marks the centenary of the battle.

The British Legion have commented: The Battle of the Somme was fought at such terrible cost that it has come to symbolise the tragic futility of the First World War. Its first day of conflict remains the bloodiest day in the history of the British Army and it was felt deeply at home, in particular in those towns and villages which had raised Pals battalions and suffered horrible losses.

Its 100th anniversary provides an opportunity to commemorate the Service and sacrifice of those who lost their lives in the battle, to reflect upon the human cost of conflict and to have hope for a more peaceful world.

The East Yorkshire Regiment of the British Army has The Battle of the Somme 1916-1918 listed in its battle honours. Kilham men were among those who served in that regiment and some gave their lives. I do hope you can join us for the service.
