It is the last day before Lent, the 40 days leading up to Easter, and was originally an ingenious way to use up rich foods, such as eggs and sugar before Lent started and most Christians began a 40 day fast. It is thought that Pancake Day could



have been a tradition even earlier and has developed from the pagan holiday that celebrated the arrival of spring where eating warm, round pancakes symbolised the sun!

Nowadays, we tend to use it as an excuse to indulge ourselves without feeling too guilty. Happy Pancake Day!

3rd Annual Wolds' Wassail

The 3rd Annual Wolds Wassail took place on Saturday 21st January in the Old Star, where Lucy Saville very kindly allowed us to use her marquee. The day started with performances by Bridlington's Makara and Hull's Rackanback Morris Groups. The Morris Dancers then led a procession through the village to Colemans Cider Company's HQ orchard where the Wassail Ceremony took place. The proceedings were led by our very own Green Man, Steven Frankish who encouraged everyone to get involved. Participants then retired to the Old Star to enjoy the full range of Colemans Ciders (a selection of which can be enjoyed all year round in the Old Star and Kilham Village Stores) and to be entertained by a range of local musicians including Carrie Martin, Martin Heaton, Tim Moon, Derek Waudby and Mike Gledhill.

The term wassail is based on the Old English words wæs (þu) hæl which translates to mean 'be healthy' or 'be whole' and form the basis of the modern English phrase 'hale and hearty'. It is a traditional ceremony which seeks to start off the first stirrings of life in the land and to help it emerge from winter and to ensure that the next season's crop of fruit, especially apples and pears, will be bountiful.

Traditionally orchard wassailing was concentrated in those parts of England where the growing of apples was most prevalent e.g. in Somerset and Devon; in Worcestershire and Herefordshire, in Shropshire and Gloucestershire.

The wassailing ceremony frequently begins in the afternoon with those taking part process down to the orchard, ceremonially bearing the wassail bowl and carrying large sticks and such items as drums, kettles, pans and whistles and anything else which can be used to create lots of noise.

The ceremony generally begins with the trees being variously serenaded with traditional "wake up" type of chants and rhymes praising the trees, their fruitfulness in previous years and exhorting them to do even better in the coming year. These chants include:-

Hats full! Caps full!

Bushel - bushel - sacks full

And my pockets full too! Huzza!

The custom then continues with the trees being beaten about the trunk with the sticks which is believed to begin the process of awakening the tree. It is accompanied by much shouting and making as much noise as possible, to assist the tree in awakening from its winter sleep as well as frightening away any evil spirits which might be lurking in the branches. Finally pieces of toasted bread soaked in cider are placed into forks in the branches or hollows in the tree and left there as offerings, whether to the tree or to the robins.

At the January Parish Council meeting it was agreed to set the precept figure to £22,300, this being the first increase in six years. Administration costs have steadily risen in that time because of additional workload of the clerk, increased professional fees, insurance and auditor fees. We wish to continue the program of repair and maintenance to the assets of the village and support the activities of the village school, KPFA and the Driffield School Twilight bus service, Youth Club and others. All this whilst keeping a healthy financial reserve to cushion the Council from the impact of any unforeseen expenditure.

The council would like to say thank you to councillor Denise Hayhurst who has been campaigning on behave of the village to retain the bus service. Denise was informed of the success and the bus time table is listed for your information.

Kilham Neighbourhood Watch

Following the recent break-in in the village, we are advising all to be aware and take extra care. Here are some guidelines from the Neighbour Watch.

Always close and lock doors and windows when you go out – even if just for a short time – and when you go to bed at night. Don't forget doors into garages or conservatories

Keep keys, including shed and car keys, in a place where they're not visible to anyone looking in. Don't leave keys in doors and never hide a spare key outside

Keep valuables hidden and not visible from windows and never leave packaging from new goods visible with your general rubbish.

Draw curtains in the evening and leave your lights on a timer switch if you're going out. Make sure one light is on upstairs.

Make sure you garden is secure, thorny plants and trellis on top of fences make it harder for intruders. Keep ladders and garden tools locked away.

If you are away—Don't publish your absence on the internet. Status updates, comments and photos on social media can all give away the fact that you are out of your home for an extended period. Wait until you come home to post all your lovely holiday snaps.


